## ESC Open 1988 – 2020

Alastair Allanach writes... The ESC Open (formerly the Artemis trophy) is inscribed from 2001 onward. I remember its reinvention in the mid 1990's, as the competition which had run initially in 1998 and 1999 then suspended by Derek Dolphin, the manager at the time, for a series of reasons including what he considered it's disruptive nature. I joined the board in 1993, and quickly for some reason was made 'Sports Director'. I thought the tournament was a good idea, inasmuch as it would bring many quality players to the Club and increase our Press exposure. In mid to late 1994, I contacted Scottish Squash (or whatever they were called at the time), asking if they could sanction the idea and suggest a date in their calendar. They somewhat reluctantly suggested the last weekend in January, suggesting that it was unlikely to be a good date for a reason I don't quite recollect. I pressed ahead regardless, and in January 1995, we reinstated the competition, the entry being weak, but the winner being Barry Sutherland from a West of Scotland Club – not S. Richardson as engraved. Barry somewhat covertly approached me just after the presentation party, and addressing me as 'Sports Director', asked if I could offer him any coaching opportunities at the Club. I demurred, saying that I would pass his message on to the correct authority. I still recollect his (perfectly fair) playing style, which completely (unreasonably) infuriated his opponent.

## The Veteran's Championship – 'The Dunlop Rosebowl'

The trophy is engraved until 2001, but, when the competition may have lapsed (no information recorded in AR's), but in recent years an 'Over 45 championship' has been resurrected, and this Trophy should be engraved with the winner's names. Discussions with John Done reveal that he was indeed first qualified to play in 1988 when he was 45.

## The Handicap Championship

Details of this competition are for some reason sparse; there appears to be no trophy, and the Annual Reports show only the six entries in the table below. The editor is very much aware that the competition endured through the millennium as he achieved the lofty position of Plate finalist around 2000. More investigation needed! Derek Bathgate knows it was being competed for in the early 1960's. Possibly Derek Bathgate in 1965, and Robin Bell in 1964. In those days, it was Hadyn Davies who organised it, and David Hollingdale reckons Hadyn made a dodgy call when refereeing the 1965 final which he lost to Derek.

**09 Nov 2020** - Simon B has now located the trophy, which helps a lot, but also leaves some questions to answered. It is engraved from 1937, but entirely with Ladies names, and a title of 'ESC Open handicap'. The opinion of the editor, aided by conversations with Sylvia Boyd and Brenda Carmichael, the last two engraved winners is that while the trophy *just* could have been a Ladies (and certainly not an Open) handicap the trophy was more than likely the 'ESC Ladies Open'. There are a few names on it which just could be non-ESC players.

**Later** – It's now evident that the trophy was repurposed in 1991, having been (probably) the ESC ladies Open from 1937 to 1962.
